


Those traveling to Texas early got to tour the King Ranch, which occupies over 825,000 acres in

the semi-arid region of south Texas. Production includes milo, cotton, cattle, oil rights, and hunting leases. The Santa Gertrudis cattle breed, a cross between Brahman and Shorthorn, was developed at the King Ranch. They are known for their ability to withstand a hot dry climate. The Ranch is a privately held corporation whose board includes 7th generation descendents of Captain Richard King.

Thursday tours visited San Jose Mission, founded in 1720, and the Alamo and Riverwalk in downtown



San Antonio. An excellent tour of the Northeast Agriscience Magnet Program in San Antonio was enjoyed by all. What an amazing opportunity for high school students!





Friday we boarded buses for the hill country, the home of Lyndon Baines Johnson, 36th President of the U.S. We toured his boyhood home in Johnson City and his ranch, the "Texas White House." We visited one of the more than 100 wineries in the area. Founder and president of Wildseed Farms, John R. Thomas, gave us a very informative talk about growing wildflowers for seed. The farm has more than 1000 cultivated acres of wildflowers in Texas and ships flower seed and seed mixes all over the country. It was interesting to hear how he developed his own machinery to harvest the tiny seeds. We also enjoyed the large gift shop!



We topped off the evening with a steak dinner prepared by Texas Young Farmers at the dance hall in Luckenbach, Texas.
