Avian Influenza Meeting Scheduled

Note: This meeting is sponsored by the Gettysburg Young Farmers in cooperation with Battlefield FFA. Both organizations are reaching out to the community in an effort to help control this devastating disease and present necessary precautions to keep the infection out of Pennsylvania. Please share this opportunity with your friends and neighbors. All are welcome and encouraged to attend.

Reserve the evening of March 8 on your calendars. Dr. John Roberts, veterinarian at the Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture, will present a 35-minute Power Point on Avian Influenza at the Gettysburg High School agriculture room. There will be time for questions and answers after the presentation.

Since December 2014, USDA has confirmed several cases of highly pathogenic avian influenza (HPAI) H5 in the Pacific, Central and Mississippi flyways (migratory bird paths). The disease has been found in wild birds, as well as in backyard and commercial poultry flocks. The good news for human health is that the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) considers the risk to people from these HPAI H5 infections to be low. No human cases of these HPAI H5 viruses have been detected in the United States, Canada or internationally.

Avian influenza is a viral disease that can infect wild birds (such as ducks, gulls and shorebirds) and domestic poultry (such as chickens, turkeys, ducks and geese). There is a flu for birds just as there is for people and, as with people, some forms of the flu are worse than others. Anyone who owns or works with poultry, whether on a commercial farm, in the wild or at a hobby/backyard farm should take proper steps to keep HPAI from spreading.

Come to the meeting on March 8 to learn biosecurity measures and get expert advice on the best way to control this devastating poultry disease.
